Auditory Processing Disorder and Reading Difficulties

Auditory processing disorder (APD) is a sensory processing deficit found to occur in approximately 5% of school-aged children (Kids Health, 2010) It is the inability or reduced ability to discriminate, recognize or understand auditory information APD adversely affects listening, comprehension,
