Teaching reading to young children is a complex process Young children develop reading skills and strategies at different rates and reach benchmarks at different times This document provides examples and characteristics of texts at levels D, I, M, P, and S Text levels are used to plan and deliver reading ...

Impact of reading from a screen versus from printed material

Students need to develop their reading, comprehension and learning skills in both arenas They need to develop one set of skills to build their competence in reading and learning from paper, however they also need to develop a completely different set of skills: digital literacy and navigation skills

The Life Cycle of Butterflies and Beetles

both have a long "i" sound spelled with different letters In the word "life", the letter "i" is long because usually words that have the vowel "i" between two consonants with the word ending in a silent "e" have long "i" sounds In the word "cycle", the "y" in the first syllable sounds like a long "i"

story we are evaluating In both instances we need to: Step 1: is IDENTIFY some differences in the two versions (original cartoon version vs the Jim Cary version) Step 2: DON'T stop there What is the IMPACT of those differences? What was the AUTHOR'S ...

Second Grade Reading Literature Question Stems

- Why did the author organize the story like this? How would it be different if the order were changed? RL26 Acknowledge differences in the points of view of characters, including by speaking in a different voice for each character when reading dialogue aloud
- Who is telling this story? How do you know?
- Who is speaking in this part?

Effective Teaching of Inference Skills for Reading

reading skills: that is, poor inferencing causes poor comprehension and not vice versa Are there different skills within inference? Different researchers have identified many different kinds of inference; however, there is no general consensus in the literature about the number of types of inference, or how they should be named

Improving Vocabulary of English Language Learners Through ...

direct vocabulary instruction Before reading a book, students activate their prior knowledge of certain vocabulary words Then, during the reading phase, students discuss new vocabulary in an authentic context In the after reading phase, students strengthen their vocabulary understanding by focusing on higher level knowledge (Wessels, 2011)
